United Methodist Women of the Indiana Conference have not sat idly at home during this time of social distancing and social isolation. Many got out their sewing machines and produced over thousands of masks for health workers, family members and neighbors. Others provided meals or helped pack lunches for school children who are being homeschooled and families needing assistance. The Lucille Raines Residence is a facility owned and operated by United Methodist Women of Indiana for recovering substance abusers. Hearing that many of the residents were out of work and unable to attend AA, NA and CA meetings, UMW members sent notes of encouragement as well as monetary donations to cover rent.

Districts and local units have held meetings using Zoom to keep in touch and to encourage each other. Personally, I experienced supportive community when my husband was diagnosed with Covid-19. United Methodist Women reached out to me with cards, calls and prayers for both of us.

A pandemic cannot stop United Methodist Women from reaching out and offering support and comfort! It's in our DNA!

lowa Conference United Methodist Women have been ministering to women, children and youth during this pandemic by making masks and gowns for local hospitals and care facilities. We have also donated and volunteered at food pantries, provided lunches for school children and provided support for health care workers by caring for their children and/or pets.

New ministries have begun by making hygiene kits and quilts for distribution as needed globally.

We are reaching out to persons listed in the Prayer Calendar by sending cards—even more intentionally that usual. Districts and Conference Leadership teams are keeping in contact through Zoom meetings and email. We have done two Conference wide studies by email, one on anti-racism work and one a study of our Purpose.

While the United Methodist Women of the Illinois Great Rivers conference are battling the pandemic discomfort and inconvenience due to COVID-19, we are busy putting faith and love into action. We continue to participate in the reading program, provide financial support for national mission institutions, Mission Giving and The Legacy Fund; Stay connected through virtual meetings, telephone calls, emails, conference calls, sending cards, and praying for those with medical needs and support during periods of grief.

Our UMW outreach activities include over 7,537 masks made for Cunningham Children's Home, hospitals, health districts, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, food pantries, housing projects, grocery store workers, The Mission Distribution Center and church members; 150 washcloth bears made for an assisted living facility; over \$200 donated to OMCOR; Volunteers working in food pantries and delivering lunches to home bound residents weekly; Cards sent to direct service staff at Cunningham Children's Home; Volunteering, donating and participating in Cunningham Children's Home first Virtual Quilt Festival; and conducting weekly Prayer Calls.

The UMW district annual meetings will be held in September and the conference virtual annual meeting will be held on October 3rd. We hope for a tomorrow without divisiveness, racism, inequalities, and injustice doing what we must do to make it happen!

The East Ohio Conference has been staying connected through phone calls, emails and Zoom meetings. We continue to reach out (the best way we are able, during these most difficult times) to those in need. Our districts have reported many local units are sewing face mask to give to care centers, first responders and other organizations that need them. Our conference Spiritual Growth and Communication coordinator have been sending our weekly "Isolation" inspirational messages.

With the health and well-being for everyone in mind we will be holding our Annual Celebration Meeting virtually using the Zoom application.

West Ohio United Methodist Women have been partnering with the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, the West Ohio Disaster Response Ministry, UMCOR, and the West Ohio All in Community to prepare Re-entry Hygiene Kits to be given to men and women returning to their communities from incarceration.

Preparing the kits entailed adding a face mask, hand sanitizer, and shampoo/conditioner to the usual list of items in a Hygiene Kit. UMCOR donated 324 kits that only needed the additional items. United Methodist Women, via their District Leadership Teams, were challenged to fill enough kits for the total to come up to 2000.

Many of our members are following Stay at Home directives because of being in a high risk group, so it was a bit difficult for those who typically would go shopping to buy the items needed. However, the women worked together, many donating the face masks they had already been making; those who could get out shopping did, and to no one's surprise, we were able to surpass the goal of 2000 kits, in cooperation with the other groups involved. Final numbers aren't in yet, but this result was impressive, and we know that we have been able to touch hearts and lives of our returning neighbors.

The Minnesota Conference is alive and well demonstrating "faith, hope and love" during this uncertain time.

- Exceeded pledge to National UMW by 34.01%
- Continued to support Emma Norton (National Mission Institution in St. Paul, MN) with a "tea" and paper product collection at every Conference and District event
- Many members took place in Virtual Day on the Hill
- Many members are joining virtual Faith Talks sponsored by National UMW
- For our commitment to the Charter on Racial Justice, the Executive Committee is doing the Implicit Bias study together as a part of every Executive Committee meeting
- A Land Acknowledgement statement is read at the beginning of every Conference meeting and is being encouraged at the district and local level also
- The Southern Prairie District created an "I Want My Mommy" postcard campaign asking the district legislators (representatives and senators) to fully fund MN MORTALITY REVIEW COMMITTEE (MMRCP) and PASS SF 2294/HF2369 in the next session to make changes to MN Stature #145.901 and MN Department of Health Rule #4615.0800 to say: "Maternal death studies conducted by Commissioner of Health expanded to include morbidity." They got the entire Conference (five districts) involved and over 3000 cards were delivered to legislators.
- Women have provided over 300 face masks to Emma Norton Services and this is just the tip of the iceberg.
 Women are sewing and donating face masks to numerous organizations at an incredible rate!
- Districts are working on strengthening their liaison relationships with local units by contacting them on a regular basis by phone or email, especially when a District or Conference event is scheduled.

- The Nominations Committee has worked diligently to keep positions filled with a diverse and dedicated group of women. At times when a job was too much for one person to handle they broke the job down into workable parts and created appointed positions. This has worked especially well with a directory leader, officer update processor, and label processor
- During the stay at home orders we have discovered creative ways to continue the mission work of our Conference. We have become experts at ZOOM meetings, voting by email, and keeping current with pertinent information on our Facebook page and website.
- We have learned new ways of learning and holding meetings which could be beneficial to future United Methodist Women. Especially in Minnesota where weather is a challenge in winter we can still meet safely and do our work
- We have learned flexibility in our expectations of participants at meetings thus and set the groundwork for getting younger women connected and more interested in supporting our Mission.

Just as our lives will be different coming out of this pandemic so will UMW. I have great hope that both with come out stronger, kinder, and closer to God. We have discovered that we can work together in adverse conditions and still support the missions we love. We have learned that to hold our tongues until it is our turn to speak at ZOOM meetings we accomplish a lot more. We have learned that even those who fear technology can learn with a little help from our sisters and we can do great things together.

The United Methodist Women of the Northern Illinois Conference is not limited to adapting to Zoom meetings. We're recognizing and answering the call to new mission opportunities and working together to make a difference in our local communities and beyond.

During the Illinois shelter in place directive, Spiritual Growth Coordinator, Ligaya Marasigan, assisted by Leadership Team members, created a "Stay in Touch" weekly Devotional. Each issue encouraged prayer, personal reflection, and a song of hope to support living through the Coronavirus changes imposed in our lives. We sought to promote unity across our membership. In doing so, we're pleased to have prayers from each District President, Jung Ja "JJ" Kim, President, Korean UMW, and Rosa Villarreal, Spanish Language Coordinator.

Ladies participated in a facial mask initiative in the following ways:

- UMW from several units and a couple of Deaconesses joined with other women's groups to make over 700 masks for a conference affiliated child-serving agency.
- One unit created a community pickup station in front of their church.
- Both Korean and Spanish women worked together sewing masks for Nursing Homes, and to supply people within their perspective communities upon request.
- The Spanish Language Coordinator and another group of ladies made masks for the Women's Treatment Center in Chicago.
- One District Leadership Team purchased and delivered masks to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center.

Other activities include:

- One unit purchased grocery bags to give their local church and community Food Pantry.
- Some units have begun to resume events and fundraising via Zoom (i.e., Salad Fiestas, Annual Flower Sales, etc.)
- One District Leadership Team is doing a Bible Study using the Reading Program book, "Which Way, Lord."
- UMW members are among a group of three churches participating in a weekly worship and adult education class.

This list is a snapshot of our women putting Faith, Hope, and Love in Action.

Great things are happening in the Michigan Conference during this crazy pandemic crisis time. United Methodist women across the conference are putting their faith, hope and love into action — in many ways.

United Methodist Women do not wait for direction when a need arises. IMMEDIATELY, women across the conference, begin making masks. Initially, for personal use, but soon masks were being made in quantity to send out to area hospitals and to all the essential health care workers and places they were especially needed. One small local unit got so busy they were highlighted on area television news,

Ways that our members are making contributions include:

- Quiet time with God in prayer, sending cards to family, friends, etc.
- Lots of phone calls and notecards sent to the home bound in their church and all members of their congregations.
- Baking cookies and dropping off to various home bound individuals.
- Providing meals to members following hospitalizations, etc.
- Holding unit / circle meetings via zoom, phone conferences
- Donating food products and giving money to food banks and school food distributions
- Grocery shop for the elderly members of their church or community.
- Working on church grounds to clean up the outside and plant flowers.
- Planning for small farmers markets to be set up and running.
- Still knitting/ crocheting prayer shawls / afghans
- Staying in contact with members of our church through online worship services, prayer groups and Bible Study.
- setting up and supplying "Blessing boxes," and local community pantries
- Delivering Easter flowers to pastors and shut ins before and for Easter Sunday
- Holding small group study opportunities on various devotional and program reading resources books,
 via zoom, Facebook and webinars.
- Holding "drive-by" for pastors who are leaving; and birthdays, anniversaries, graduations of church members

I am especially proud of how our Mission u committee got busy and has set up a webinar, for the membership, on the Spiritual Growth study, "Finding Peace in an Anxious World." The Rev. Dr. Devon Herrell, who was going to train and teach this mission u study in our conference, has prepared the material and is offering a weekly class to span four weeks.

Personally, I think that what we will be dealing with will get worse before it gets better. I believe that my membership, which is primarily in the most vulnerable age range, is primarily concerned with everyone's health and safety. The local units and the districts and our conference have all been very responsible about cancelling their events and activities. I was very glad that the NCJ was also postponed. We are now at the time that we need to seriously consider how we will move forward, into the fall, and beyond; ie. district and conference annual celebrations, re-scheduling the NCJ event. We are anxious to hear from our National Office and our jurisdictions for direction and advice about how we should be moving forward.

Thank you for this opportunity to share the great things that are happening around our conference and voice our concerns about the future.
